Stay and Play Getaways

With a bounty of things to do and meals to savor, these amenity-rich lodgings make ideal one-stop vacations in Chicago and Galena. We've also included a few must-see spots within each town.

CHICAGO

The Windy City's award-winning hotels wow guests with personalized, exclusive experiences. Connect with concierge professionals who go beyond dinner reservations to bring your downtown dreams to life.

THE PENINSULA CHICAGO

Expect curated programming via the hotel's Peninsula Academy programs as The Peninsula Chicago marks its 25th anniversary. Experience popular offerings at the hotel's restaurants, rooftop terrace and recently revitalized spa—or collaborate with staff to plan private moments. Chef Concierge Ruben Carballo says chartering a yacht reveals a unique perspective of the city's skyline. He helped sync a guest's proposal to a stunning display over Navy Pier. "As the yacht glided onto Lake Michigan and the fireworks began to shimmer in the sky, he got down on one knee beneath a cascade of lights reflecting on the water and popped the question," Carballo shares.

THE LANGHAM, CHICAGO

Set within a Mies van der Rohe-designed modernist structure, The Langham, Chicago embraces its location among architectural icons on the Chicago River. The Michelin Two Key hotel gives guests

plenty of reasons to stay on-site, including the club lounge, formal afternoon tea at Pavilion, Chuan Spa treatments, an indoor pool, and private screenings in the cinema suite. For families with youngsters, the Kids Suite makes the perfect play area. It's also a convenient base for Resort in the City add-on experiences, like behind-

the-scenes art tours, cocktail-making classes, a round at Harborside International Golf Center and a VIP helicopter adventure.



The Les Clefs d'Or concierge at Park Hyatt Chicago wants to learn the story behind each stay. Pre-trip conversations with guests help to craft experiences that feel considered and completely one-of-a-kind. With their popular Pedal and Picnic program, borrow bikes and an instant camera, personalizing a keepsake map with photos as you cycle between lakefront landmarks like Navy Pier and Millennium Park. On-site NoMI packs charcuterie and artisanal pastries to fuel your ride. If you prefer to stay in for an elevated meal, the restaurant's real standout is sushi, with fresh fish flown in from Japan. Staff suggest pairing a salmon avocado roll with their Watercolor Gin, a citrusy collaboration with local Wolf Point Distilling.

Stepping out CHICAGO

Coordinate special moments through your hotel concierge, but don't miss Chi-Town's most celebrated attractions. Purchasing a Chicago CityPass saves money on one-time admissions to five favorites, so you can splurge on other things like fine dining and take-home souvenirs. Use the pass to make a reservation at **Shedd Aquarium** and **Skydeck Chicago**, then pick three more from a list that includes **Adler Planetarium**, **Art Institute of Chicago**, **Field Museum**, **Griffin Museum of Science and Industry**, **Shoreline Sightseeing Architecture River Tour**, and **360 Chicago** observation deck. (Reservations are required at some attractions; contact them for more information.) Tickets are valid for nine days, starting on and including the first day you visit an attraction.

GALENA

Destination-worthy accommodations dot Illinois' Driftless Region. These noteworthy properties forge a bond between people and place, inspiring you to plot your return trip right away.

IRISH HOLLOW

Wake up to dewy mornings in Irish Hollow's storybook valley, where chic private cottages with screen porches cluster around the two-suite inn. Early risers can meander through pastures, woodlands, wildflower fields and wetlands on the 500-acre estate and adjoining nature preserve before sitting down to a gourmet country breakfast delivered to your door each morning. Multicourse meals are prepared from the inn's organic gardens, with candlelight dinners in the Old General Store and private campfire suppers casting a romantic glow. Book a rejuvenating couples massage from the Body Work menu or add a seasonal floral arrangement to bring the spirit of the grounds inside.

JAIL HILL INN

In 2015, Matthew Carroll transformed a historic four-story brick jailhouse into an elegant escape. "We redid everything, and we did it in the best way, appealing to the modern, sophisticated traveler," Carroll says. The innkeeper's meticulous renovation paid off: Within four years, TripAdvisor named Jail Hill Inn the top-rated bed-and-breakfast in the country and second in the world, with high marks continuing to the present day. Carroll's impeccable hospitality attracts "repeat offenders" who return to celebrate special occasions, with many trying all six distinctive suites. Wine and cheese at welcome, gourmet breakfasts, plush king beds, fireplaces, and spacious decks contribute to the inn's five-star reviews.

EAGLE RIDGE RESORT AND SPA

Four championship golf courses get visitors into the swing of warm weather at Eagle Ridge. Select from a guest room at the inn, or choose from 150 distinctive homes and villas (with pickleball, pontoons and a pool) across The Galena Territory's rolling 6,800 acres. In June, the Great Galena Balloon Race launches here. Watch hot-air balloons ascend, or book a private sunrise or sunset flight and glide 3,000 feet up with Galena on the Fly (May–October). Then, center yourself at the recently expanded and reimagined Stonedrift Spa. Saturday nights, Woodlands Restaurant serves an all-you-can-eat prime rib buffet.

Stepping Out GALENA

Life in Galena's countryside moves at a more relaxed pace, but activities abound. Panoramic views reward hikers at **Horseshoe Mound Preserve**, where winding trails lead to sunrise and sunset overlooks. Plan a ruminant-related excursion with **Galena Goat Yoga** or **Hoof It Goat Treks** for up-close and personal interactions with curious creatures. Oenophiles cultivate a sense of contentment at a winery. Savor sweet Daffodil at **Massbach Ridge Winery** just outside Elizabeth, or toast with Giacomino Vino in the Tuscan-style atmosphere at Hanover's **Fergedaboutit Vineyard and Winery**. Start with a tasting at **Galena Cellars Vineyard and Winery**, then soak up the sights on the wraparound porch at golden hour.

Par on the Prairie

Launch your tour of Illinois' nearly 300 public golf courses with these 10 memory-makers.

Cog Hill Golf and Country Club,
Palos Park

Play a Fantastic Foursome

Of the course quartet at **Cog Hill Golf and Country Club** in Palos Park, No. 4 is the most famous, nicknamed Dubsdread for the fear it strikes in the hearts of high handicappers—think tight landing areas and heavily bunkered greens. Opened in 1964, Dubsdread has made lists of America's top public courses.

Practice Getting Up and Down

With a 289-foot elevation change over its 18 holes, The General course at **Eagle Ridge Resort and Spa** in Galena lets you play king of the hills. The signature par-4 fifth hole drops 175 feet from tee to green and offers a tristate view. In winter, the 10th hole is used for sledding.

Test-Drive a Tom Fazio Design

Renowned course architect Tom Fazio created **The Glen Club** in Glenview from a former naval air base on Chicago's North Shore, turning level runways into rolling fairways surrounded by mature trees, lakes, streams and native prairie grasses. "The earth moved to create the golf course and it's truly astounding," says Ethan Roush, head golf pro. "You would never expect so much elevation change on what used to be a starkly flat naval air base." Roush notes the course begins easy and finishes tough. "No. 1 has a wider driving area and allows for a gentler start to the round, while No. 18 has ruined many a good round with its two lakes and eight bunkers."

Quarry for Birdies

Nine newer holes at **The Highlands of Elgin** in Elgin flow around the 12-acre lake from an old stone quarry, joining the original nine in a diverse layout. An elevated tee at the par-3 seventh offers vistas of the lake and the Prairie-style clubhouse. Water guards the 15th green on three sides.

Sample Scotland

Loch St. James and 20 St. Andrews-style sod-wall bunkers make **Mistwood Golf Club** in Romeoville a Midwest version of Scottish links. The eighth hole, Royal Split, has been ranked one of the country's top par 5s. The par-three 14th hole, Kelpie's Lookout, starts a stretch of four holes named for the Scottish water devil.

Satisfy Your Jones for Golf

Legendary architect Robert Trent Jones Jr. turned marshland near a West Chicago airport into **Prairie Landing Golf Club**. "The entire site was transformed into rolling and meandering landforms completely from our imagination," says Bruce Charlton, president and chief design officer of RTJ II. Charlton's favorite holes are the fifth and the 11th, both drivable par 4s. On the fifth, Charlton says, "A heroic drive over the canal to the left can reach the green." On the 11th, he says, "The entire right side of the green and approach is guarded by an enlarged existing farm pond."

Whether you're soaring above the skyline on the Centennial Wheel or dancing at a free festival, Navy Pier brings the fun all summer long. Take in stunning city and lake views, enjoy live music and cultural showcases, savor iconic Chicago flavors, and hop on classic rides that make you feel like a kid again. And of course, cap it all off with fireworks shimmering over Lake Michigan. From lakefront strolls to family adventures, Navy Pier is made for you.

Salute Architect Arthur Hills

Stonewall Orchard Golf Club in Grayslake was the first Illinois course by Arthur Hills, who left design footprints all over the Midwest. He incorporated thousands of trees and several small lakes, bringing water into play on 12 holes. The par-five 18th is a tough finisher, requiring three solid shots to a small green.

Tee It Up Like a Pro

Built for pros and host to the PGA Tour's annual John Deere Classic, **TPC Deere Run** in Silvis was designed by Illinois native D.A. Weibring, three-time winner of the tourney's forerunner, the Quad Cities Open. The course showcases the Rock and Mississippi rivers' valley landscape—elevation changes, hardwood trees, deep ravines and small ponds.

Forest Bathe on Your Backswing

For **ThunderHawk Golf Club** in Beach Park (47 miles north of Chicago), Robert Trent Jones Jr. sculpted a scenic yet challenging course at a Lake County Forest Preserve. One of those, the eighth hole, has a short par 4 that requires accuracy off the tee to stay on the fairway with wetlands. The final hole combines all of Mother Nature's natural elements, including a wetland, mature trees and a rock-lined stream.


Swing Dramatically

The team of Hurdzan-Fry wove **WeaverRidge Golf Club** in Peoria out of farmland, routing holes around wooded valleys, creeks and lakes. Elevations change dramatically on the back nine, beginning with the downhill 10th hole and ending with a lofty tee shot at the par-five 18th. The par-three 12th features another delightful drop.


Is Dubsread too daunting? Three other courses at **Cog Hill Golf and Country Club** in Palos Park are tamer. **Bolingbrook Golf Club** in Bolingbrook is another beauty from designer Arthur Hills. With 10 ponds dotting **Naperbrook Golf Course** in Plainfield, you'd better pack extra golf balls. Built in the 1930s, **Highland Park Golf Course** in Bloomington is almost as old as Route 66. Of the nine holes at Atlanta's **North Greens Golf Course**, seven have water hazards. Since it opened in 1996, **Piper Glen Golf Club** in Springfield has been known for being tough but fair—and fun. The 18th at **Arlington Greens Golf Course** in Granite City is one of the area's most difficult finishing holes.

BROADWAY IN CHICAGO

Chicago

Don't throw away your shot to celebrate *Hamilton's* 10th anniversary of its Chicago debut along with America's 250th when the megamusical returns (March 4–April 26), this time to CIBC Theatre.

CORN STOCK THEATRE

Peoria

During their summer season (typically five shows, May through August), this community theater brings the music, comedy and drama to a massive tent in Laura Bradley Park. It will be the company's first full summer season under their newly replaced tent in 2026.

ILLINOIS SHAKESPEARE FESTIVAL

Bloomington

Hamlet promised “the play's the thing.” Judge for yourself during an outdoor production on the grounds of Ewing Cultural Center, where a professional repertory company and emerging artists stage classic plays by the Bard and others (late June through early August).

THE SPOTLIGHT THEATRE

Moline

With six main-stage productions (*West Side Story* rumbles through June 12–21), a children's company and improv comedy shows every Friday and Saturday night, this beloved community theater is a reliable crowd-pleaser.

STEPPEWOLF THEATRE COMPANY

Chicago

The scrappy ensemble that has included Gary Sinise, Laurie Metcalf, John Malkovich and dozens of other acting luminaries wraps up its 50th season of ground-breaking performances with the drama *Catch as Catch Can* (June 4–July 12) in their Lincoln Park theater.

THEATRE IN THE PARK

Petersburg

Honestly, Abe would be proud of the players at “Illinois' Official State Theatre,” who present a summerlong blend of musicals, comedies, classics and history plays on an outdoor stage at Lincoln's New Salem State Historic Site (May through August).

After the scenic bluffs overlooking the Mississippi River inspire couples to say “I do,” they can host a next-day jaunt to the on-site mountain biking park and/or treat wedding guests to one of the resort’s river cruises. At **Pere Marquette Lodge and Conference Center** in Grafton, weddings can be held in the historic Great Room, with its 50-foot-high ceilings and 700-ton limestone fireplace. A few miles from Nebo, a hunting lodge doubles as a B&B and resort. Each of **Heartland Lodge’s** knotty-pine-and-cedar cabins has a king-size bed, fireplace and heart-shape jetted tub inside, along with a private deck and firepit to roast marshmallows and make your own s’mores. “Our private luxury cabins are a favorite among honeymooners and anniversary couples,” says Zach Jumps, Heartland Lodge’s marketing director.





Two traditions—a train trip to Chicago and a growing must-see list of destinations, museums and restaurants—have become the highlight of one family’s summer travels.

When I moved our family from Florida to my home state of Michigan, one of the first things on the pro list made me smile: We’ll be closer to Chicago. The deal sweetened further when I realized our new house was minutes from the Amtrak station. We choose The Drake Hotel for its proximity to many of our favorite attractions as well as its history and elegance, a guaranteed way to dazzle my kids. My oldest daughter is an ambulatory wheelchair user, which can be a daunting experience in a big city. Staying in the heart of our exploration area has eased accessibility concerns and allowed Midwest hospitality to shine through. Everyone we’ve encountered on our trips has been helpful and accommodating.

Over the course of three days, we’ve been able to check off every one of our list experiences and then some, elevating our Chicago trip to fabulous family getaway.



Here are some favorites from our Windy City bucket list ...

□ CHICAGO SUNSET CRUISE

We've enjoyed other architectural boat tours along the Chicago River, but this evening ride is more laid-back. After grabbing a quick dinner at Coq d'Or at The Drake Hotel (the kids loved the phyllo-wrapped mozzarella sticks), we boarded a 90-minute sightseeing cruise. The double-decker Wendella boat travels into Lake Michigan, where you can savor the sunset accompanied by a family-friendly playlist and then return to port with the skyline aglow. The bar on the lower level offers snacks and drinks, including kid-friendly options like hot chocolate.

□ GRIFFIN MUSEUM OF SCIENCE AND INDUSTRY

I'm still captivated by my own childhood memories of exhibits from this museum, and it's thrilling to watch my kids share that fascination. A few favorite permanent exhibits we all enjoyed: *YOU! The Experience*, *Take Flight*, and *Science Storms*. We were all captivated by the human cross-section specimens in *YOU! The Experience*, and found the stories of athletes who persevered despite disabilities inspiring. My plane-obsessed son loved exploring a section of a United Airlines Boeing 727 in *Take Flight*, and convinced his sister to join him for an interactive flight simulation (an additional ticket purchase). In the *Science Storms* exhibit, the 40-foot tornado stole our attention and answered a lot of our questions, followed by the miniature DIY vortices we were able to create with the countertop fogger.

□ HIDDEN GEMS

Seneca Park is one of my favorite lesser-known spots, buried in the heart of the city next to Chicago Fire Department Engine 98 (an architectural treasure that resembles a castle) near Chicago Water Tower. The park features two playgrounds that are clean and quiet in the morning, making this the perfect place to sip a coffee while the kids burn off some early-morning steam. A 15-minute walk away on North State Street, P.O.S.H. is a delightful boutique with European flea market vibes, including pantry items, vintage goods, housewares and unique children's gifts.

□ ICONIC EATS

More than anything, we look forward to the food on our trips! Our family strives to sample the holy trinity of Chicago eats—Giordano's pizza, Garrett Popcorn and Stan's Donuts. Although there are several Giordano's in the city, we love the Rush Street location. Since the wait time is a little longer for deep-dish pizza (worth it!), we pull out our card games and fill the time. Garrett Popcorn—also available in several locations—is a great last-day visit to stock up on popcorn for the train ride home, as well as a souvenir treat for family and friends. We can never decide between the caramel and cheese popcorn, so Garrett Mix, a combo of the two, is our favorite. And don't plan to go to Stan's without leaving with multiple doughnuts. Their selection of flavors is so enticing, you'll want to try them all. The Le Stan Croissant and the Nutella doughnut are always among our picks. We often choose the Millennium Park location so we can take a box of doughnuts to the park and enjoy them while we people-watch.



□ DINING DISCOVERIES

Two new-to-us destinations from recent visits will definitely make future lists. After a full day of adventuring, the cozy, family atmosphere of Quartino Ristorante delivered the relaxed evening we needed with shared pasta plates, candlelight and delicious wine. Cindy's Rooftop, located on the 13th floor of the Chicago Athletic Association, charmed with its upscale yet family-friendly atmosphere and great menu. Their truffle fries and lamb shawarma bowl were big hits at our table. The stunning views of Millennium Park and Lake Michigan alone were enough to make Cindy's a five-star experience.

□ MILLENNIUM PARK

Come for an iconic photo at the Bean and stay to wander the park's other attractions, including Crown Fountain and the Jay Pritzker Pavilion. Faces are projected on the fountain's two glass towers, which bookend a reflecting pool. (Bring bathing suits for the kids—there's a nearby accessible public bathroom.) If you time your visit right, you may be able to listen to a rehearsal of the Grant Park Orchestra or catch one of the many free events and festivals produced by Chicago's Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events throughout the summer months.

□ NAVY PIER

The skyline backdrop at this lively venue is great for family photos, while the rides delight my thrill-seeking youngest child. The Centennial Wheel is always a family favorite, and the ride is long enough that you can relax and enjoy some of the best views of the city.

□ OHIO STREET BEACH

A 1-mile walk from The Drake Hotel, this sandy spot bustles with summertime energy and serves up a beautiful slice of Lake Michigan. The kids love watching the volleyball players and hunting for lake glass.

At the end of our visit,

leaving the city is always the hardest part—but definitely more palatable after we've successfully checked off so many great adventures. Fortunately, next summer promises another train ride and a new list of memories waiting for us.

A ROYAL NOTE: REMEMBERING PRINCESS DIANA'S CHICAGO VISIT

In June 1996, Princess Diana graced Chicago with a three-day visit to raise funds for cancer research. During her stay, the beloved royal called The Drake Hotel home, specifically Suite 550, now affectionately known as the Princess Diana Suite. This elegant 1,500-square-foot retreat features a stately living room, cozy reading nook, kitchenette, spacious bedroom and one-and-a-half baths. Expansive windows frame sweeping views of Lake Michigan and the city's magnificent skyline. For a true royal experience, reserve afternoon tea at the hotel's legendary Palm Court, where both Princess Diana and Queen Elizabeth II once sipped and savored.

Diana's Chicago itinerary also included the Field Museum, where today, visitors can see Máximo, the towering titanosaur that stands 28 feet high and 122 feet long. Don't miss SUE, the world-famous *T. rex*, or the museum's immersive ancient Egypt exhibit.

During her visit, Diana traveled in style: a 1996 Rolls-Royce Silver Spur, now part of the collection at the Volo Museum in Volo. The royal vehicle is displayed in Showroom 5, along with hundreds of other classic collector cars and more than 60 Hollywood favorites, including the Family Truckster from *National Lampoon's Vacation*.

ALL ABOUT THE SIDES

While Romeoville's **White Fence Farm's** house specialty is flash-fried chicken, all entrees come with a bevy of sides, plus your choice of mac and cheese or potato.

SHAKE IT UP

Braidwood's **Polk-A-Dot Drive In** features statues of famous figures like Elvis Presley, who could be professing his love for the eatery's popular milkshakes via his song "All Shook Up."

ALL DAY, EVERY DAY

Open 365 days a year, the **Old Route 66 Family Restaurant** in Dwight serves breakfast, lunch and dinner. Nostalgic decor includes signs and vintage gas pumps. Cross the street to see **Ambler's Texaco Gas Station**, one of the oldest continuously operated gas stations, now open as a visitors center.

BREAKFAST, BURGERS, A BUFFET AND MORE

Since 1928, **Dixie Family Restaurant** in McLean has been satisfying hungry road-trippers. The down-home restaurant is part of the **Dixie Travel Plaza**, the oldest continuously operating Route 66 truck stop.

LAND OF GIANTS

Lumi, a 19-foot-tall statue of a waitress with cat-eye glasses, holds an apple pie outside of **Country-Aire Restaurant** in Atlanta. The family-style establishment is known for its daily specials. Discover more fiberglass statues three blocks away at the **American Giants Museum**, across the street from the **Bunyan Giant**.

100-PLUS YEARS OF HISTORY

The **Ariston Cafe** in Litchfield reigns as one of the oldest operating Route 66 restaurants. Locals love the weekly specials, like the prime rib on Fridays and Saturdays. The nearby Vic Suhling Gas for Less neon sign leads to more local and Route 66 history at the **Litchfield Museum and Route 66 Welcome Center**.

DOWN-HOME DIGS

Signs and photos from previous incarnations line the walls of **Weezy's Route 66 Bar and Grill**, a yellow-and-brown brick roadhouse in Hamel.

START YOUR ENGINES

It's bumper-to-bumper memorabilia at **Route 66 Motorheads Bar and Grill, Museum and Entertainment Complex** in Springfield. The car-themed menu includes apps, burgers, wraps and sandwiches, pizza, and nightly specials (like lobster tail and garlic shrimp). After dinner, motor over to the **Route 66 Drive In**, which shows feature flicks on two screens.

WHITE-LINEN DINNER


Traditional decor—dark-wood paneling, stained glass and a tin ceiling—complement the fresh ingredients (herbs grown on the rooftop) of **Maldaner's Restaurant**. It's been open since 1884 in downtown Springfield.

DIPPED DOGS ON STICKS

Ed Waldmire debuted his battered and fried hot dog on a stick at the Illinois State Fair in 1946. His grandson, Josh, owns and operates **Cozy Dog Drive In** in Springfield. His best advice for road-trippers is to plan ahead, as a lot of small businesses are closed on Sundays. Less than 2 miles away, a 20-foot-tall Muffler Man holds a flag at **Lauterbach Tire and Auto Service**.

A SIGN OF THE TIMES

While a drive-thru feels almost obligatory on a road trip, **Maid-Rite** in Springfield was one of the first U.S. restaurants to have one in 1924. In the last century, not much has changed at the converted caboose restaurant serving up loose-meat sandwiches. Continue down memory lane at the **Route 66 Legends Neon Sign Park** in the Illinois State Fairgrounds.

SKYE P. MARSHALL

Passion for the performing arts—and a determination to challenge herself—shaped every step of this breakout actor’s journey from a Chicago striver to Hollywood success.

Watch Skye P. Marshall stride through scenes as Olympia Lawrence in the critically acclaimed CBS legal drama *Matlock*, and the actor’s background as a dancer and airman makes sense. Her complex character cross-examines witnesses with grace and grit—two attributes Marshall gained coming of age in Chicago in the ’90s.

When her parents separated, Marshall’s East Coast childhood ended. She and her two siblings returned to Chicago’s North Side with their mom. The move challenged and changed Marshall. She learned to navigate, then embrace, the City of Big Shoulders.

Staying busy as a teen kept Marshall on track for success. She credits dancing (foot-working, hip-hop and street jazz) with deepening her appreciation for Black culture. High school jobs at FAO Schweetz (the candy store) and Shedd Aquarium taught her the value of hard work. Before landing film and television roles, Marshall’s star power shone as the Lincoln Park High School prom queen.

The Northeastern Illinois University grad describes a dramatic performance at Chicago’s Steppenwolf Theatre as a career-inspiring experience. “I was moved in a way that was so different from what I was expecting,” Marshall says.

Now based in Los Angeles, she and her husband, *Chicago Fire* actor Edwin Hodge, return often to visit family.

Q Before you began acting in film and TV, you were a dancer. Do any of those early performances stay with you?

A Preparing for the annual Bud Billiken Parade was my equivalent to the Emmys. We were celebrated, citywide, for our unique performances—for the culture in the projects and predominantly Black public middle and high schools. My favorite memories from my time in Chicago are wrapped around my fellowship with Full Effect and U-Phi-U dance troupes. We would battle other dance teams all over the

city. Before there was twerkin', we were footworkin'!

Q Those moves are legendary. How did your Chicago upbringing help shape your sense of self?

A Chicago taught me how to survive and thrive through hard work and the performing arts. At the young age of 13, I had to learn how to take the L train and bus to school with my sister. At 15, I started my first job at FAO Schwarz inside Water Tower Place. Chicago taught me adaptability, resilience and independence. It exposed me to the vastness of my culture in a way that the silver-spoon life in Virginia didn't. I fell in love with my Blackness, my body and my saucy spirit.

Q Why did you enlist in the Air Force before turning to acting?

A I joined the military in 2000 to pay for college. I understood at a young age

how crippling debt could be for young adults, and I didn't want that for myself. I used the GI Bill to pay for my education. Mission accomplished.

Q Countless stars come from Chicago. Why do you think the city produces incredible talent?

A What makes Chicago such a fertile ground for creativity and drive is the unique blend of grit, soul and working-class resilience. Chicago is a blue-collar city at heart. It teaches its artists to hustle. To show up, even when the odds are against them.

Q Did using your middle initial in your performing credits help you stand out?

A "P" is for Patricia, my incredible mother's name. My mother is my angel and my favorite person on earth. Thanks to the success of *Matlock*, I was able to purchase her a house near family. I visit quite often, or she travels to wherever I am.

Q Speaking of *Matlock*, you and Kathy Bates have fantastic chemistry. How do you account for the show's success?

A Kathy Bates is one of the realest people in the game. We led with respect, preparation and admiration from the start. I've been blessed to hit the lottery with my fantastic cast and phenomenal crew. When I read the first script, I knew it was going to be something unique and exciting for audiences. Every day when I show up, I trust my instincts and let my inner child play.

Q Each episode packs so much drama into an hour. Any hints for fans leading into Season 3?

A Exactly! So much drama, with even more twists and turns that will have you feeling every emotion.



A continuous cascade of fruits draws U-pick enthusiasts beginning with strawberries in early May, and blackberries and ripening peaches in mid-June, while the farm store abounds in crave-worthy treats. Wish you could drink in all the peachy goodness? Try a can of Eckert's Peach and Quiet hard cider.

RENDLEMAN ORCHARDS

Alto Pass

Roots run deep at this EcoCertified orchard, where five generations have nurtured stone fruit trees. Fuzz-skin peaches and their smooth-skin cousins, nectarines, dazzle with color from June through August. Hand-select your sweet gems from their Farm Market or get free shipping on a peach gift box.

TENDERLOIN FARMS

Edwardsville

Lavender reigns supreme on this aromatic farm, where sisters Kim Hansen and Kris Straub transformed their family farm—primarily used for animal farming for more than 100 years—into a purple paradise. Craft a bloom bundle featuring multiple varieties from the U-pick fields or take home a plant or lavender sachet. Lavender season typically runs late May through June.





With eight breweries packed into a walkable 2-mile stretch, Chicago's Malt Row entices craft-beverage fans with its easygoing charm and impressive variety.

Half Acre



Roughly a decade ago, breweries and distilleries began setting down roots in Ravenswood, drawn by the neighborhood's welcoming vibe and its stock of historic industrial buildings with soaring ceilings, ample room for tanks and barrels, and plenty of character. Today, Malt Row offers a flavorful cross-section of the community.

Start your tour just north of Irving Park Road and wander up Ravenswood Avenue to Balmoral. Along your stroll, sip your way through an array of stops, from Chicago's first legal post-Prohibition distillery to a cozy wine-tasting room—and even a taco spot boasting an expansive mezcal menu.

1. DOVETAIL BREWERY

The master brewers focus solely on Continental European styles and traditional methods that tempt your senses. Learn more during a 90-minute tour of the brewery (Saturdays).

2. BEGYLE BREWING

Come for the monthly trivia and bingo, stay for diverse brews, like Free Bird Pale Ale, and a dog-friendly patio.

3. HOP BUTCHER FOR THE WORLD

Hops is the word at this taproom with exposed brick walls and a selection of more than 15 house-made pale ales and double and triple IPAs.

4. HALF ACRE BEER COMPANY

One of the Windy City's largest breweries, Half Acre boasts an expansive beer garden, seasonal food menu and weekly beer flights, plus year-round drafts like the iconic Daisy Cutter.

5. SPITEFUL BREWING

Sip the crisp, dry flagship beer, Spiteful IPA, on the patio or head inside this industrial, dog-friendly taproom for a round of darts.

6. IS/WAS BREWING

What a saison-style beer tastes like now is most likely to change the next time you visit, hence the brewery's name.

7. CULTIVATE BY FORBIDDEN ROOT

Chicago's first botanical brewery creates innovative flavors inspired by ingredients such as strawberries and basil. Taste the results in Strawberry Basil Hefeweizen, a fruity wheat beer.

8. DEMO BREWING COMPANY

This husband-and-wife team loves to experiment, which is a perfect fit for their nano brewery with an ever-changing tap list.

Three More to Try

Koval Distillery

The city's first distillery to open since the mid-1800s, Koval uses a grain-to-bottle approach by sourcing ingredients for its whiskey, gin and specialty spirits from trusted farmers.

Vin312 Winery

Look for the red door behind Cultivate by Forbidden Root. What began in the owner's basement has grown into a tasting room with popular monthly events like jazz and salsa nights.

Rojo Gusano

Handmade corn tortillas and salsas star on the menu, along with mezcals made from 100 percent agave. On the weekend, pop in for brunch or dine on the patio (summer only).

Pick Up Pickleball

A sport with a barrier to entry as low as the net height, pickleball combines elements of tennis, badminton and Ping-Pong—and has gained itself quite the following in Illinois.



History

Eager to keep his kids entertained in 1965 but unable to find a full set of badminton rackets at his home outside Seattle, Joel Pritchard got creative. He swapped in Ping-Pong paddles and a bouncy plastic ball, lowered the badminton net and, together with friends and family, invented the game known today as pickleball.

Roundup of Outdoor Courts

Public parks incorporate free, permanent arenas around the state for pickleball showdowns.

Swing by the nine courts in Bloomington's Rollingbrook Park, Duncan Park's six in Springfield, or the eight at Champaign's Centennial Park. Averse to waiting? The 25 courts at Plummer Family Park in Edwardsville make lines unlikely. Warm up on the trail near the four courts in Peoria's Charter Oak Park, and serve after sunset at the 16 spotlit spaces in Chicago's Grant Park.

Erin L'hommedieu-Neavor recommends pickleball to anyone who travels often. "Wherever I visit, I can find a court. And if you walk up by yourself with your paddle, people are generally welcoming," the director of community relations for the Central Illinois Pickleball Club says. She bounced a few other reasons to play our way:

1. The area of play is smaller than a tennis court, so it's accessible to competitors of a wide range of fitness levels.
2. Courts have popped up all over Illinois. To keep up with demand, various public park districts are transitioning from tennis to pickleball courts and building exclusive pickleball courts.
3. The essential gear is affordable and easy to acquire: paddle, ball, court shoes and protective eyewear.
4. It's a more fun cardio workout than a hotel's treadmill.
5. Open play sessions let you compete against many soon-to-be vacation friends.



Pier-fect Getaway

As Navy Pier marks its 110th anniversary this summer, the Chicago landmark is just as family-friendly, appealing and cutting edge as ever.



THEN

Much has changed since Navy Pier opened July 1916, but some key things remain. The pier was built on 20,000 logs driven into the lake bed to support the structure. The same pilings remain more than a century later, along with enhancements to ensure structural integrity.



NOW “The Centennial Wheel is the perfect way to see the city,” says Navy Pier Vice President of Advancement Elizabeth Halajian about the nearly 200-foot-high attraction. “And now we have Flyover in Chicago, a 4D experience that sends guests swooping through skyscraper canyons and soaring to sights no one ever sees, in a fully immersive exploration of our incredible city and the iconic places, fascinating people and unbreakable spirit that make it great.”

Navy Pier visitors can take in a play or musical performed by the Chicago Shakespeare Theater, a free fireworks show on

Wednesdays and Saturdays (Memorial Day to Labor Day), or one of the Live on the Lake! free summer concerts.

Bike and Roll Chicago rents pedal bikes, e-bikes and quad bikes for exploring the Pier on a car-free paved trail and adjoining 18 miles of the Lakefront Trail, while Tall Ship *Windy* offers seasonal excursions.

The 233-room Sable at Navy Pier, a boutique Hilton hotel, has maritime ties as well. It's named after the aircraft carrier *USS Sable*, where former President George H.W. Bush trained during WWII when Navy Pier was used as a naval training facility.





TRIP #1

Play in the Parks

White Pines Lodge, Mt. Morris

DAY 2

Continue east to the Rock River Hills region, unpacking lunch at Valley View Picnic Area within Castle Rock State Park in Oregon. It's one of the few places in Illinois to find exposed St. Peter sandstone, and home to dozens of fern species. Then, double back to White Pines Forest State Park in Mt. Morris. Forging Pine Creek gets your wheels wet, but you're rewarded with verdant views of moss-covered bluffs. Keep your eyes peeled for fleeting spring blossoms like trout lily and hepatica.

OVERNIGHT Step back in time when you stay at the White Pines log cabins in Mt. Morris. Originally constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps, renovations enhanced these landmarks by preserving character while adding modern conveniences such as air-conditioning, TVs and mini fridges. Catch a show at the Playhouse Theater and wake up hungry for homestyle cooking at The Lodge restaurant.

DAY 1

Start with bird's-eye views from Mississippi Palisades State Park's four scenic overlooks. Massive cliffs and formations along the Mississippi and Apple rivers provide a rich habitat for raptors like bald eagles, red-tailed hawks, ospreys and kestrels. The 2,500-acre park features 15 miles of hiking trails, plus vertical routes for climbers at Twin Sisters, Indian Head, and the Sentinel.

OVERNIGHT In addition to water with plentiful bass and bluegill, Timber Lake Resort and Campground in Mt. Carroll is well stocked with theme weekends, rock concerts and amenities like the poolside margarita bar. Choose from fully equipped cabins, RV sites or rustic tents, all with Wi-Fi access. Across the road, the 371-seat Timber Lake Playhouse stages professional productions (May 29–August 30).



DAYS 3-4

Linger in LaSalle County, where seasonal waterfalls and cool canyons attract visitors to a trio of state parks within 10 miles of one another along the Illinois River. Matthew Klein, cofounder of the organization Starved Rock Hikers, recommends visiting less-frequented trails at the east end of Starved Rock State Park. His favorite spot is Council Overhang, a large sandstone cavern. Feet beat? Rent an e-bike at Buffalo Rock State Park near Ottawa to zip along the I&M Canal State Trail. In order to snap stunning waterfall photos in Matthiessen State Park, just follow the sound of rushing water from the parking lot to nearby Lake Falls. Back at Starved Rock, board a themed trolley tour or a relaxing sunset cruise, both departing from the Starved Rock Lodge and Conference Center.

OVERNIGHT Toast to a memorable trip with a sunset meal at The Veranda, a lodge diner, or by adding a celebratory basket to your Starved Rock Lodge and Conference Center reservation. Sweet dreams follow bubbly, whether you're staying in a cabin or a room in the historic lodge. (Check their website for package details.)





HOME ON THE RANGE DAY 3 DETOUR

Rare and endangered plants and wildlife flourish at Nachusa Grasslands, a 4,100-acre Nature Conservancy preserve open from dawn to dusk in Franklin Grove (20 minutes south of Oregon). Bison, Blanding's turtles and regal fritillary butterflies benefit from The Nature Conservancy's ongoing ecosystem restoration efforts.

Bring binoculars and venture beyond the visitors center walking loop via five marked trails. Nachusa Grasslands hosts occasional guided hikes through remnant prairie, woodlands and wetlands, as well as free bison tours Saturdays and Sundays, May–October.

TRIP #2

Rock Out in the Park

Scramble over impressive stone features and watch for reptiles on this trip along the hilly highways and winding roads of Shawnee National Forest.

Giant City State Park, Makanda



DAY 1

Begin your journey on the western edge at Giant City State Park in Makanda, where one-hour guided horseback trail rides depart from the stables three times a day. For those on foot, spring visits offer scenic advantages. Ephemeral waterfalls pop up after rain showers, and bright blossoms dot Trillium Trail. Natural Resources Coordinator Jennifer Randolph-Bollinger considers this rugged 2-mile loop a premier wildflower trail in the region. “Usually by mid-April, we’re in full, glorious bloom,” she says. Lush, green vegetation fills out the woodlands by summer. On the 1-mile Giant City Nature Trail, visitors thread through skyscraper-like sandstone formations that house small creatures in crevices.

OVERNIGHT After adventuring, recover with reservations at the historic Giant City Lodge and Restaurant, known for its all-you-can-eat fried-chicken dinners. Thirty-four comfortable cabins surround the Civilian Conservation Corps-era lodge, outdoor pool and lookout tower. Swing by “the mushroom rock” Devil’s Standtable and interpretive displays at Giant City Visitor Center before you leave the area.

ON THE TRAIL

WINE NOT?

Midway between Giant City State Park and Snake Road, Alto Pass is a hub on the 45-mile, 11-stop Shawnee Hills Wine Trail. Alto Vineyards and Von Jakob Winery and Brewery span a five-minute stretch. Pay a small tasting fee at each for locally produced samples.



DAY 2

Before arriving in Goreville, study the map of Ferne Clyffe State Park to determine your preferred pathways among 11 varied trails. If it's hot outside, cool off behind the flow on Bork's Waterfall Trail. Day-trippers delight in an easy, half-mile hike to the 60-foot falls. Extending through to Cedar Bluff links routes for a 10-mile challenge. Climbers take Rebman Trail to a designated rappelling area, where trad, sport and top rope fans approach dozens of named and graded routes. At sunset, follow twinkling fireflies into Round Bluff Nature Preserve, just past Lake View Shelter, to marvel at its enchanting ecosystem.

OVERNIGHT Family vacations on Lake of Egypt in Goreville inspired Kris and Matt Shellabarger to open Red Roof Retreats. This cluster of one-of-a-kind rental properties and a tiny gift shop serves visitors seeking a lakeshore getaway. Steep wooden stairs lead to a shared dock, where paddleboards and other water toys await.

DAY 3-4

Relax into the trip's back half with a sunset visit to Garden of the Gods Recreation Area near Herod. Panoramic views make the Observation Trail the most popular hike in the Shawnee National Forest. This quarter-mile interpretive trail features steep grades leading to bluff-top vistas. Stay cautious along the cliffs as you snap photos with Camel Rock, Table Rock and Devil's Smokestack as your backdrop. Rim Rock National Recreation Trail is also a 10-minute drive from Timber Ridge Outpost, with an accessible upper segment and a lower portion that leads to Ox-Lot Cave. The overhang was a stop on the Underground Railroad.

OVERNIGHT An online search of "tree house resorts for sale" brought Andrew Hoffman and his extended family to Southern Illinois from Alaska in 2022. Now co-owners of Timber Ridge Outpost and Cabins, they welcome visitors to treetop and cabin lodgings. The Outpost offers Bigfoot souvenirs, ice cream and a small hot food selection.



Snake Road, LaRue-Pine Hills

IT'S THE SEASON SNAKES ON A ROAD

West of Alto Pass at LaRue-Pine Hills, the spring reptile migration overtakes a closed-off segment locals call Snake Road. Bring binoculars to safely spot slithering cottonmouths and other species swapping rocky hibernation spots for wetland feeding grounds. Hobby herpetologists also delight to hear frog and toad mating calls fill the air.

Discover art in unexpected places—tucked away in a park, incorporated into a garden or prominently displayed along a Main Street. These small towns, each with a unique vibe, welcome you to embrace the creativity found both inside and out. **WRITER KRISTIN HAGENSON**

EFFINGHAM

This vibrant, arts-friendly community sits at the interchange of interstates 57 and 70, where you'll find The Cross at the Crossroads, a soaring 198-foot-tall memorial. Head downtown, where every year, about 25 new pieces of art are selected for Sculptures on the Avenues, part of a self-guided walking tour. Another self-guided tour takes visitors through the Effingham Art Guild galleries found at the library, Effingham County Museum and Effingham Performance Center.

GALENA

While this former iron ore river-port town turns 200 this year, it has retained much of its elegant 19th-century architecture. More than 125 independent restaurants, boutiques and galleries line downtown. Finishing Touches of Galena showcases original paintings and jewelry from regional artists. Just outside of downtown, find artist John Martinson's steel sculptures at West Street Sculpture Park. Follow paths to discover 50 works, both large and small, across 2 wooded acres.

GRAFTON

At the confluence of the Mississippi and Illinois rivers sits this town of less than 700 people. The population reached its peak of 10,000 during the 1850s, when limestone was quarried from the surrounding bluffs for buildings like the one that now houses the Grafton Art Gallery. The space features works from more than 40 local and regional artists with an emphasis on being a place of connection, community and creativity. A block away, kids clamber on a giant turtle, frog and catfish at Lighthouse Park along the Mississippi.

MAKANDA

In the 1970s, artists like Dave Dardis moved into this former railroad hub surrounded by the natural beauty of the Shawnee National Forest. Dardis helped revitalize the Boardwalk, a strip of shops dating to the late 19th century. Rainmaker Arts and Entertainment sells his handmade water fountains and jewelry—and serves as a portal to a magical outdoor garden behind the shop. Follow twisting, sometimes mazelike, paths to discover whimsical sculptures, architectural salvage and a peaceful koi pond.

OREGON

An impressive, almost 50-foot-tall concrete statue, *The Eternal Indian* (also known as the Black Hawk Statue), gazes from the bluffs above the Rock River just outside of town. It's a stunning creation by sculptor Lorado Taft, who founded the Eagle's Nest Art Colony in 1898. Follow the Sculpture Trail to see his statue and 18 additional works of art, or head downtown to the Coliseum Museum, which houses almost 1,600 pieces, including pottery, glassware and wood carvings.



WOODSTOCK

With an iconic town square and ornate 19th-century Victorian architecture, Woodstock is possibly best known as the backdrop for Bill Murray's 1993 movie *Groundhog Day*. The town installed a permanent sculpture, *Whorled*, by Bobby Joe Scribner, that reflects the city's appreciation for public art on the main roundabout. Every month, the 1889 Woodstock Opera House showcases a new exhibit. Upcoming themes include nature photography and watercolor painting.

A MATTER OF TIME

July 4 marks America's 250th anniversary of independence. In honor of the country's semiquincentennial, explore a dozen historically significant destinations that helped shape the Land of Lincoln.

A mob murdered newspaper editor Elijah P. Lovejoy, an advocate for free speech and the abolition of slavery, in Alton. The **Lovejoy State Memorial** stands near his grave at the Alton City Cemetery. About 65 miles north in Jacksonville, **Woodlawn Farm** operated as an Underground Railroad site. The now living-history museum is open for tours (May to September) with programs about freedom and inclusion.

1837

Lewis and Clark spent two days at the now **Fort Massac State Park** in Metropolis. While there, they recruited an interpreter and prepped for their winter encampment at Camp Dubois (now the **Lewis and Clark State Historic Site** in Hartford). This modern interpretive center tells the story of the Corps of Discovery, which was Thomas Jefferson's vision of liberty and expansion after 1776.

1803

800-1400 A.D. Outside of Mexico, the largest pre-Columbian settlement in North America exists near Collinsville. The **Cahokia Mounds World Heritage Site** culture was in existence for almost 1,000 years as of the signing of the Declaration, and the descendants still here today are represented by multiple tribes.

1778

Local townspeople celebrated their independence from Britain by ringing a brass bell on July 4 when Virginia troops captured Kaskaskia during the Revolutionary War. The **Kaskaskia Bell State Memorial** later became known as the Liberty Bell of the West.



The U.S. Army forced thousands of Southeastern Native Americans to relocate to reservations in Oklahoma. Following a rugged trek through Southern Illinois, some members of the Cherokee, Creek and Chickasaw nations were trapped at makeshift winter camps south of the state forest. A harsh winter and lack of food caused thousands to die. To mark this tragic event, the forest in Jonesboro was renamed **Trail of Tears State Forest**. Historic sites like this serve as a reminder of the gap between the Declaration of Independence's promises and the U.S. policy toward Indigenous peoples.

1838



Commemorate the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.



1858

Speaking at the Republican State Convention, senatorial candidate Abraham Lincoln gave his “House Divided” speech on June 16 at the now **Old State Capitol State**

Historic Site in Springfield. He declared his belief that the U.S. could not remain half slave and half free, and that the trend was toward legalizing slavery. The issue eventually led to the Civil War.

1889

Cofounder of Chicago’s Hull House, Jane Addams was more than just an advocate for the poor. She worked for women’s suffrage, peace and immigrant rights, broadening liberty and equality to those groups left out in 1776. Free and open to the public, the **Jane Addams Hull-House Museum** offers public tours twice a week. Admirers seeking reflection on her legacy can visit the **Jane Addams Burial Site** in the Cedarville Cemetery (120 miles northwest of Chicago).

1894

Labor Day is just one of the results of the Pullman Strike, which pitted labor against the government. In Chicago, workers led a strike against the Pullman Palace Car Company. The strike affected much of the U.S. railways and the delivery of mail. Federal troops under the guise of a court injunction were sent to the Windy City to end the strike. Learn how the Pullman Strike reshaped American labor relations at the **Pullman National Historical Park** in Chicago.

Frances Willard was elected president of the Woman’s Christian Temperance Union (WCTU). Under her direction, the WCTU became the largest women’s organization in the U.S. and tackled social reform issues beyond temperance, including women’s suffrage, labor and prison reform, and age of consent. Learn more at the WCTU’s headquarters, the **Frances Willard House Museum** in Evanston. Forty years later, Illinois became one of the first states to ratify the 19th Amendment.

1879

A national campaign for an eight-hour workday brought about worker strikes and demonstrations throughout the U.S. Following an incident in Chicago that resulted in the deaths of unarmed striking workers, supporters gathered for a public meeting at Haymarket Square. A bomb was thrown into the crowd, and police responded with gunfire. More than 10 people were killed and dozens more wounded. Afterward, event organizers, speakers and others with unpopular political views were arrested, tried and some sentenced to death. Chicago’s **Haymarket Memorial**

invites people to reflect on free speech, labor and assembly rights.

1886

Best known as Mother Jones, Mary Harris Jones was a labor organizer who fought for better conditions for mine workers and championed child labor reforms in labor struggles and liberty in the workplace. Miners built the **Mother Jones Monument** at her burial site in the Union Miners Cemetery in Mt. Olive, alongside miners who died in the 1898 Battle of Virden.

1936



“This campaign can’t only be about me,” said Barack Obama to a crowd of 17,000 as he stood on the steps of the **Old State Capitol State Historic Site** in Springfield, announcing his campaign for presidency. Obama became the first African American U.S. president (2009–2017).

2007

CHICAGO'S RIVERFRONT REVIVAL


The Chicago River has anchored many eras of urban change over the past 150 years. Decades of restoration work and investment have turned it into a photogenic destination for play, culture and history.

Long before Wrigley Field, Navy Pier and the Willis Tower skyscraper, a meandering prairie stream rippled through this stretch of Lake Michigan shoreline. Without the waterway—and the commerce it facilitated—the thriving Windy City may have never sprouted here. “This river served as the conduit into the expanding United States,” says John Quail, a director with Friends of the Chicago River.

Some of the Chicago River’s past expressions were bright and shiny. Others cast dark shadows, like the era of meatpacking plants discarding waste into the water. During the early 1900s, a system of canals and locks literally reversed the river’s flow away from Lake Michigan. This altered flow remains the norm today, as does strategic clean-up and conservation initiatives radically reviving the river.


In its latest form, the Chicago River is an epicenter for aquatic creatures, Chicago residents and all types of water-loving visitors. Revitalization efforts, notably the vibrant 1.25-mile Chicago Riverwalk, have generated a hub for food and drink, paddling and boating, lodging, and soaking up some of the city’s most iconic urban scenery.



Green Renaissance

Bubbly Creek, the nickname for the South Fork of the South Branch of the Chicago River between the Bridgeport and McKinley Park neighborhoods, got its label nearly 100 years ago from a disturbing phenomenon caused by stockyard waste decomposing below the surface. Today, that history is hard to fathom, due to efforts from Friends of the Chicago River and other conservation groups who have improved water quality and conservation. "It's a great spot to talk about reclaiming the river," John Quail says. Bubbly Creek now hosts rowing teams, The Bridgeport Art Center, and Canal Origins Park. The city is partnering with Shedd Aquarium and others to restore natural wetlands and enhance wildlife habitat for beavers, fish and birds.


ON WATER Aboard one of the many architectural tour boats, expert guides layer history and factoids over the photogenic scenery. “Visitors regularly say the best \$45 they spent in Chicago is going on one of the boat tours,” John Quail says.

Family-owned Wendella Tours and Cruises launched the first architectural boat tour in 1935. Ninety years later, the company offers a full menu of specialized tours, along with Chicago River Boat Architecture, the Chicago Architecture Center and other operators showcasing the dazzling skyline and water.

Alternatively, with a simple \$10 one-way ticket between any two dock locations, visitors and locals hop aboard the Chicago Water Taxi for aquatic transportation to dinner in Chinatown or iconic city landmarks. For the most intimate and immersive experience, Urban Kayaks presents rentals and guided paddling tours on the bustling, historic waterway. “People are always amazed by how natural the river feels when you’re down in it in a kayak or canoe,” Quail says.

ON LAND It’s basically a scientific fact that food and drink tastes richer when paired with a sparkly waterfront view. The Chicago Riverwalk serves up a bounty of all three across more than 1 mile of urban scenery in the heart of the city. Add twice a week DJs to the decadence with a stop at City Winery Riverwalk. Or diversify your fermented libations in the open air at The Northman Beer and Cider Garden with free live music daily throughout the summer.

For an educational moment, the McCormick Bridgehouse and Chicago River Museum spirals five stories above the Riverwalk. Step inside to grasp the engineering and inner workings of Chicago’s world-famous moveable bridges. Just a couple of blocks away, you can pause at the frothy fountain in Vietnam Veterans Memorial Plaza with a tribute to those who served. Whether you’re cruising on foot, skates or bicycle, plan extra time to linger with the many public art offerings. Consider starting at the Riverwalk Gateway murals under Lake Shore Drive before working your way west.



Fresh flavors and fun await every summer Friday at the open-air Downtown Elgin Market (3 to 7 p.m.).

DO

If gambling floats your boat, Elgin's **Grand Victoria Casino** offers 750-plus slots, Vegas-style table games and fine dining on the Fox River. Despite its Christmas name, **Santa's Village Amusement and Water Park** in East Dundee is a summer wonderland of thrill rides, waterslides and animal encounters. And you can meet the Man in Red during his offseason.

EAT

Since 1954, **Herb's Bakery** in Elgin has been handcrafting raised and cake doughnuts, Kringles, coffee cakes and other sweet treats. Try their soft Bavarian pretzel roll. The beer garden at **Diamond Jim's Tavern and Gas Grill** in East Dundee is the place to be in summer. There's a Friday fish fry and live music on Saturdays and Sundays.

STAY

The newly renovated, full-service **Holiday Inn and Suites Chicago Northwest** in Elgin has an indoor pool for the kiddos and on-site Bennigan's restaurant with a VIP Lounge and TVs to catch all the action. In West Dundee, wake up on plush sheets at the newly renovated **Best Western Plus**, which offers a complimentary full hot breakfast and state-of-the-art gym and pool.

CHICAGO & BEYOND

 **Elgin**

History and nature dance together in Elgin, a city named for a song—and in step with the rhythms of time.

 **POPULATION**
114,797

OF NOTE
The name "Elgin" comes from a Scottish hymn, "The Song of Elgin," city founder James Gifford's favorite tune.

About 40 miles northwest of Chicago along the Fox River and historic Route 20, Elgin beckons with a harmonious blend of small-town and urban vibes. The self-proclaimed City in the Suburbs was once known as the Butter Capital of the World, home to the famed Elgin National Watch Company and producer of the first self-oiling windmill.

Experience the rural side in Hampshire at **Muirhead Farmhouse**, the only farmhouse designed and built by Frank Lloyd Wright. Still belonging to the Muirhead family, this example of Wright's Usonian architecture is open for tours on select dates from May through October.

Elgin's **Historic District** includes original parts of the town as laid out by founder James Gifford in the 1840s. Many Queen Anne homes here were owned by watch company executives, and the all-brick First Universalist Church was designed to resemble a pocket watch. Elgin also has several Sears catalog homes from the early 1900s; neighborhood self-guided walking tours are available.

Outdoor recreation is big in Elgin, thanks to the Fox River. The waterway draws paddlers, while the **Fox River Trail** that runs beside it offers 40-plus miles of biking and hiking routes. Not far from downtown, **Lords Park** encompasses a museum, nature trails and a zoo.



ILLINOIS INSIDER

The inventor of the Ferris wheel, George Washington Gale Ferris Jr., was born here.

DO

Artifacts inside the **Galesburg Railroad Museum** include dining-car china and employee uniforms. Outside, see a steam locomotive and other rolling stock. Outside the Old Main building at **Knox College**, stand where Lincoln debated Stephen Douglas in 1858 and see the window Abe climbed through to reach the stage.

EAT

Cherry Street Brewing Company has been Galesburg's party place since 1984, ensconced in a storied 1870s building. Try their chicken wings with a house-brewed RubiRita Cherry Cream Ale. Come for the cocktails, stay for a fine-dining experience at **Craft on Seminary Street**. Expect attentive service, warm ambience and fresh takes on classic steaks and seafood.

STAY

The **Best Western Prairie Inn and Conference Center** welcomes four-legged family members. Some of the rooms have private patios that access a courtyard with a gazebo, yard games and putting green. **Holiday Inn Express and Suites** offers a free hot breakfast and an indoor pool, plus a 24-hour coffee station and a lobby market for snacks and beverages (including beer and wine).



GREAT RIVERS COUNTRY

Galesburg

Still a busy railroad hub, Galesburg adds new chapters to its rich history. The city is home to Carl Sandburg and Knox College.

It's easy to reach Galesburg by car—the town sits along Interstate-74, about 45 minutes south of the Quad Cities and about three hours from both Chicago and St. Louis. But for an authentic Galesburg experience, consider taking the train. Founded in 1837, centrally located Galesburg grew into a railroad center not long after the first Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad arrived in 1854. Today, eight Amtrak passenger trains (four eastbound, four westbound) serve Galesburg on national and regional routes, and the town still has one of the nation's busiest rail yards. From **Icehouse Park**, you can watch more than 130 trains pass through each day.

Before the Civil War, Galesburg was a stop on a more secretive route—the Underground Railroad. The town was founded in 1837 by antislavery advocates who simultaneously established **Knox College** and one of the first antislavery societies in Illinois. Knox College would later become famous for hosting the fifth Lincoln-Douglas debate in 1858. Galesburg native Carl Sandburg won three Pulitzer Prizes, two for his masterful poetry and one for his highly regarded biography of Lincoln. At the **Carl Sandburg State Historic Site**, celebrate the writer's legacy by visiting the three-room cottage where he was born in 1878.





Champaign-Urbana

These campus towns aren't just for students, parents or alums. Consider your visit a chance to take a crash course in fine art, good eats and warm hospitality.

Outside the university's Foellinger Auditorium, there's an "echo spot" where your voice reverberates.

The twin cities of Champaign-Urbana (Chambana to some locals) have long been anchored by the **University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign**. With an enrollment of 60,000, it's one of the country's largest public universities, and the sprawling campus (6,000-plus acres) is dotted with historical buildings, striking modern structures and peaceful green spaces. **Krannert Art Museum** and **Spurlock Museum** are perennial favorites, as is the **Illinois Arboretum**, with more than 100 acres of beautiful botanical gardens and other serene natural spaces. The Arboretum's Japan House features Sen Cherry Tree Allée, a stunning canopy of cherry blossoms that typically peaks in mid-April.

Gies Memorial Stadium, home to Fighting Illini football, is also one of 45 points on the **Champaign County African American Heritage Trail**, which traces 170 years of local African Americans' contributions to society. Among the names etched in the stadium's 200 stone columns is that of William F. Earnest, the first African American from Champaign County to die in World War I. **State Farm Center**, the on-campus basketball arena, doubles as a concert venue, part of Champaign-Urbana's vibrant live-music scene. The **Rose Bowl Tavern** in downtown Urbana, **Pour Bros.** in downtown Champaign, and near-campus **The Canopy Club** are some of the hottest evening spots.

ILLINOIS INSIDER

See the stars at the state's only International Dark Sky Park, Middle Fork River Forest Preserve.

DO

At **Meadowbrook Park** in Urbana, marvel at large-scale works in the Wandell Sculpture Garden. The **Krannert Art Museum** collection spans continents and eras. Andy Warhol's pop-art portrait of Marilyn Monroe is a highlight. The **Spurlock Museum** houses artifacts from across the globe, including a barong dance costume, an ornate lion design from Bali.

EAT

Premium steaks, fresh seafood and classic cocktails are all on the table at **Hamilton Walker's** in downtown Champaign. With locations in Champaign and Urbana, **Black Dog Smoke and Ale House** has you covered for Southern-style barbecue and craft beer. At **Riggs Beer Company** in Urbana, taste the farm harvest at their beer garden.

STAY

On-campus **I Hotel and Illinois Conference Center** rooms surround you in warm contemporary style in Champaign. Put the high in **Hyatt Place** when you book an upper-floor room with views of downtown Champaign. Start the day with their breakfast bar, then grab a burger or sandwich from **The Placery** in the lobby.

TRAILS TO ADVENTURE
Marion

Marion is one of the state's fast-growing areas, yet it's a great place to slow down and savor nature, the arts, sports and treats.

DO

Concerts, plays, films and pageants bring audiences to the **Marion Cultural and Civic Center**, a 1,094-seat performance venue on Tower Square Plaza, where the historic Orpheum Theater once stood. **Perfectly Posh Boutique** stocks trend-forward fashions and accessories, while **Lavish Bath Box** bubbles over with balms, bombs, scrubs and soaps. Escape to **Mandala Gardens**, a botanical sanctuary that invites you to go for a walk (there's a labyrinth) or sit in reverie.

EAT

Taste world-class coffee crafted with unique brewing methods at **Crown Brew Coffee Co.** It's served in an atmosphere designed to build community one cup at a time. Invest in breakfast or lunch at **The Vault Cafe on the Square**, located in a former bank. The vault is still there—and you can eat at a table inside it.

STAY

Indulge in Vegas-style luxury, glamour and gaming 30 minutes from downtown Marion at **Walker's Bluff Casino Resort** in Cartersville. High-style rooms come with personal service and access to fine dining, a pool and a spa.



Crab Orchard National Wildlife Refuge

Marion not only serves as the Williamson County seat but also enjoys a front-row seat to a parade of traffic crisscrossing Interstate-57 and Route 13. Travelers with a smart exit strategy can trade miles of high-speed pavement for acres of natural beauty and the relaxed pace of a small town rich in culture and charm. The jewel in the crown—and it's an emerald, given the green lushness—is **Crab Orchard National Wildlife Refuge**, 44,000 acres of diverse flora and fauna. It's a place to unplug from tech and reconnect with nature by hiking, canoeing, photographing wildlife and bird-watching. Experience varied ecosystems, too, like oak-hickory upland

forest, bottomland hardwood forest, grazing areas, brushland, prairie, wetlands and lakes.

Speaking of water, it's fine year-round at **The Hub Recreation Center's** indoor aquatics center. Glide down a two-story waterslide, loll on a lazy river, or let kids splash in a zero-depth entry pool with a small waterslide. Serious swimmers work out in a 25-yard lap pool, and there's a hot tub for soothing soaks. Sports fans can watch fast cars at the **Southern Illinois Raceway** and fastballs at **Mtn Dew Park**, the home field of Marion's collegiate baseball team, the Thrillville Thrillbillies.

TRAVELER INFORMATION

DRIVING IN ILLINOIS

Illinois highways and roads are well maintained and provide posted signage for drivers, so taking a road trip is a breeze. Chicago is a day's drive or less from major cities including Cincinnati, Cleveland, Detroit, Indianapolis, Kansas City, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Pittsburgh, St. Louis and Toronto.

State law requires you to wear a seatbelt when traveling by car. Speed limits are posted in miles per hour (mph) and vary between 70 mph on rural interstates and freeways and 55 mph on urban interstates and freeways.

You may not use your cell phone for texting while driving, and you must use hands-free technology to make calls.

ILLINOIS TOLLWAYS

Some northern Illinois highways require tolls for use. Rates vary; toll plazas do not have attendants. Electronic toll collection is available through I-PASS or any transponder that's part of the E-ZPass system.

Drivers who miss tolls have 14 days to pay online. Note the license plate, date, time and locations of unpaid tolls—that information will be required when submitting payments online.

REST AREAS AND WELCOME CENTERS

The state of Illinois serves drivers with 53 rest areas and 11 welcome centers, located on highways throughout the state. Open 24 hours a day, they offer restroom facilities, picnic areas, lighted walkways, maps, security cameras and parking for recreational vehicles, among other services. For locations, visit idot.illinois.gov

ARRIVING BY PLANE

Domestic travelers can fly direct to destinations including Belleville, Bloomington-Normal, Champaign-Urbana, Decatur, Marion, Moline, Peoria, Quincy, Rockford and Springfield, as well as Chicago.

Once you land at either of Chicago's two major airports, Chicago Transit Authority trains can get you downtown. For info, go to transitchicago.com

Regular shuttles to many Chicago downtown hotels leave from each airport. You can also get a taxi or rideshare. For more information on getting to and from Chicago's airports (including renting vehicles or arranging car services), visit flychicago.com

From O'Hare International Airport, the Blue Line elevated train (known as the L) takes passengers to downtown Chicago in about 45 minutes. Follow the CTA Trains or Trains to City signs at the airport. If you arrive at the international terminal, follow the signs to the Airport Transit System, where you can get a free ride to Terminal 2 and then catch the L into the city.

From Chicago Midway International Airport, the CTA Orange Line L train takes about 25 minutes to get to downtown Chicago.

OTHER TRANSIT AROUND CHICAGO

Metra runs commuter rail services from downtown Chicago to outlying suburbs and surrounding cities. For maps, schedules, alerts and more, visit metra.com

The Regional Transportation Authority serves Chicago and its many suburbs. Its RTA trip planner can help you figure out how to get where you want to go. The Regional Day Pass allows riders to travel on all three transit systems with one purchase. Visit rtachicago.org

Amtrak runs trains to 30 cities in Illinois, and Greyhound Lines serves most major Illinois cities. Go to amtrak.com or greyhound.com

21 AND OLDER

Legal statewide, alcohol, gambling and marijuana use by adults may vary by city or municipality.



If you drink, don't drive. Instead, hail a cab or use a rideshare app. The state's legal limit for blood alcohol is 0.08.



Seventeen casinos operate throughout the state; some of these are riverboat casinos.



The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act legalizes the lawful use of cannabis for adults (21 years and older).



The Smoke-Free Illinois Act prohibits smoking and vaping in most public places, including theaters, museums, casinos, restaurants and bars.




